The Dawn of Civilization

Anthropologist Margaret Mead has declared that the dawn of human civilization was 15,000 years ago. Do you know what criteria she used to determine this milestone? Do you suppose it was the use of tools? Or an organized encampment? Or artwork drawn on the walls of caves? Or the cultivation of crops? Pottery?

No, it was none of these things.

The earliest known indicator of civilization was identified by finding the remains of a human who had a broken femur — the big thigh bone — that had healed. The healing indicates that this specimen had lived several years beyond the breaking of his bone. The healing also indicates that someone else had been caring for this individual while they recuperated. A caring person indicates civilized society.

Normally in nature, an animal would die of starvation with an injury as serious as a broken femur. It couldn't hunt, couldn't gather, couldn't get to water, couldn't fend off predators. It would die.

But in this case, some other member of the tribe cared for the injured person until the injury healed. And then they went on to live a normal life.

What separates humans from the animal world, according to Mead's definition, is mutual care and compassion for one another.

Today's equivalent threshold might be getting a covid vaccine and wearing a mask in public. Don't think of these as tools of control; think of them as marks of civilized society. For by these simple acts we demonstrate a basic concern for our vulnerable neighbors.

Bible Readings and Reflections

September 2021

Sunday, September 5 – 15th Sunday after Pentecost

Proverbs 22; Psalm 125; James 2:14-17; Mark 7:24-37

Martin Luther, whose motto was always, "we are saved by faith," despised the book of James, which emphasizes the opposite. James says that faith without works is dead. I don't think they disagree. James is just reminding us that there are certain observable fruits of the spirit. I like to say, "Love gets its hands dirty."

Sunday, September 12 – 16th Sunday after Pentecost

Proverbs 1:20-35; Psalm 19; James 3:1-12; Mark 8:27-38

This week Mark relates to last week's reflection on James. Jesus says that his identity ("the Messiah") is vitally tied to his actions (suffering for the sake of the gospel). So his followers — that's us! — have a choice to make. If we want to follow Jesus, we have to take up our own crosses in service.

Sunday, September 19 – 17th Sunday after Pentecost

Proverbs 31:10-31/Psalm 1; James 3:13-4:3, 7-8; Mark 9:30-37 I like to use object lessons during my Sunday morning messages for children. It helps them (and all of us) remember the lesson. Jesus used an actual child as an object lesson. "Whoever welcomes a child welcomes me." Protect the vulnerable. The first shall be last and the last shall be first.

Sunday, September 26 – 18th Sunday after Pentecost

Esther 7; Psalm 124; James 5:13-20; Mark 9:38-50

James says that prayers of the righteous are powerful and effective. I believe that, too. But if, say, we are in the grips of an epidemic and someone claims that prayer – not vaccines or masks – is sufficient protection, I disagree. Prayer is not magic. Prayer helps us align our desires with God's will, but God also provides analytic minds and doctors and scientists who are all part of God's plan, too. Get the shot.
